## **Measure H Benefits Countywide**

- County wide website: <u>www.la-hop.org</u>
- Improvements to 211 information line
- Additional multidisciplinary outreach team
  - Mental Health
  - Physical Health
  - o Drug/Alcohol
  - o Peer to Peer
  - Law Enforcement



# **Measure H Benefits Countywide**

- Measure H revenues are primarily to provide SERVICES (not for building housing) for the homeless
- Measure H raises the sales tax by ¼ % for the next 10 years from 10/1/17
- Measure H is for Prevention and for Homeless Services
- The public passed Measure H by 69.24%



# City of Whittier Homeless Plan

January 2018 - County awarded a \$50,000 grant to establish a three (3) year homeless plan.

The City of Whittier was one of the 41 cities of 88 cities in LA County that received funding, which covers **90%** of the homeless in LA County



# **Homeless Plan Adopted 7/24/18**

- City Council adopted a three year homeless plan
- There are four goals with 26 objectives
- No additional City staff nor budget
- Working with Whittier Consortium on Homelessness, the county, Whittier First Day and LAHSA
- This is not a three year plan to end homelessness but a guide to start the process

#### **Law Enforcement**

- Police Resources calls for homeless related service are the highest category
- · 9<sup>th</sup> Circuit Court of Appeals Boise case Sept 2018 Police cannot criminalize indigent, homeless people for sleeping outdoors, on public property
- Need for more visible presence of street engagement teams in Whittier

#### **Parks**

- Park encampments growing in size
- Use of BBQ areas
- · Illegal activity- increased incidents of shops found in parks
- · Families feeling unsafe and not using park area
- Greenway Trail issues
- Sports organizations now effected
- Parks employees feel unsafe due to aggressive interactions with some homeless individuals



#### **County Grant**

- Two \$300,000 grants available to the city to support implementation of the homeless plan
- Deadline: November 7, 2018

#### Student Homelessness

Whittier College Center for Engagement with Communities



- There are approximately 2,500 homeless students in Whittier, grades K-12
- Rio Hondo College homeless efforts- food pantry, housing referrals
- Whittier College homeless efforts- POET emergency fund, starting to raise awareness



May 2018: Whittier College Student Homelessness Coalition was formed

Over 19 Community Based Organizations have been in attendance

Steering Committee formed: Whittier College, Boys and Girls Club, Whittier City School District

#### Four goals created:

Goal 1: Make homelessness resources more available.

Goal 2: Provide/Encourage public education on student homelessness.

Goal 3: Provide programming that aims to lower homelessness.

Goal 4: Coordinate and Collaborate towards sustainable housing.



- Close the gap in resources through creating a forum for groups to share information
- Two Whittier College Interns working on resource guide update, looking at transportation issues, etc.
- Needs of school districts identified. Overall themes: motel vouchers, grocery gift cards, non perishable food items, hygiene kits, before and after school program vouchers, tap cards,
- Boys and Girls Club offering free memberships to all students experiencing homelessness in Whittier City School District






